

ASCOT-Carer SCT4/INT4

Domains

1	Occupation	The unpaid/family/friend carer is sufficiently occupied in a range of meaningful and enjoyable activities whether it be formal employment, unpaid work, caring for others or leisure activities
2	Control over daily life	The unpaid/family/friend carer can choose what to do and when to do it, having control over his/her daily activities
3	Self-care	The unpaid/family/friend carer feels that s/he is able to look after him/herself, in terms of eating well and getting enough sleep
4	Personal safety	The unpaid/family/friend carer feels safe and secure, where concerns about safety include fear of abuse, physical harm or accidents that may arise as a result of caring
5	Social participation and involvement	The unpaid/family/friend carer is content with their social situation, where social situation is taken to mean the sustenance of meaningful relationships with friends and family, and feeling involved or part of a community, should this be important to the carer
6	Space and time to be yourself	The unpaid/family/friend carer feels that s/he has enough space and time in everyday life to be him/herself away from the caring role and the responsibilities of caregiving
7	Feeling encouraged and supported	The unpaid/family/friend carer feels encouraged and supported by professionals, care workers and others, in their role as a carer
